SCHOOL PRODUCTION



Pupils also had their first tutorial which introduced them to their topic based around the question "How do we tackle the biggest killer of humans: the



mosquito" and also set the pupils their first of four weekly homework tasks. Pupils then enjoyed four tutorials in school from their own PhD Tutor, Rebecca, who is a graduate Scientist from the UEA. She is using her specialism to deliver fun, small group sessions to our students which culminated in preparation for the 2,000 word assignment answering the topic question. All of our pupils have passed the assignment with a 1st or a 2:1, which is absolutely SUPERB!

At the graduation ceremony on Saturday 20th May pupils enjoyed a sun filled day at the UEA, for the first time the ceremony

took place on a Saturday which meant that parents and siblings could be at the graduation day. Pupils enjoyed a study session, tour and а general university session. Parents joined pupils for a couple of the sessions, but also had their own tour and an information session about university! 

CAREERS EVENTS



Neatherd's department Careers has been busy usual with as several activities taking place. In January we welcomed over 30 different apprenticeships providers of school. Our Year 9 and 10 students had the chance to meet the companies, get some vital information about different apprenticeships available and to talk to the advisers about possible routes they could take into their profession of choice. Apprenticeships are getting more and more popular with the number of businesses which offer them growing all the time. We understand that apprenticeships are not for everyone, but the Apprenticeship Fair also offered general advice about a variety of different careers.

In co-operation with Breckland District Council we also organised a Business breakfast which Neatherd students from Years 7-9 and local employers attended. The students guizzed the adults about what life at work is like and asked questions like "What do you like about your job?" and "What skills are employers looking for?" while tucking into bacon rolls. The main aim of the event was to allow local employers and students to engage and learn from each other and for the schools to find out what skills businesses are looking for in students", says Fleur Ramm, Business Growth Apprentice at Breckland Council. "I was really impressed with the students", says Phil Hayton from Westcotec, "they seemed so enthusiastic to find out more about what life at work is like." The next big "Careers project" will be the Year 10 Work Experience during w/c 10th July. Most of our students' placements are sorted by now and the pupils are starting to get really excited to be able to experience a week in the "world of work". We were very sad to say "Goodbye" to Mrs Andrea James who has been giving valuable Careers advice over the last 2 1/2 years to our students in Upper School. They really valued her input and it helped them to decide what next steps to take after they leave Neatherd. Mrs James will be taking up a new position with the NHS in Kings Lynn. Our new Careers advisor is Melinda O'Connor who will be joining us from 6th June for two days a week.

FRIENDS OF NEATHERD
